

What a great time of year - especially being around a farming community. This is the time when the year's work pays off and it is time to harvest. I really enjoy the daily drive; every day the view changes. The corn has been tall for a few months, now within a day or two, when you pass a field that has been harvested it gives the countryside a new look and I am able to see further. This also leads me to say PLEASE be careful with your driving as trucks, semis, and combines will be driving down the roads. We wish everyone a safe and bountiful harvest.

The Meridian Board of Education met on September 16, 2015, and approved the 2015-2016 annual budget as presented. The Budget Hearing was held at 7:00 P.M. and the 2015-2016 Tax Request Hearing at 7:15 P.M. The 2015-2016 General Fund expenditures are set at \$3,550,000.

The District Assessed Valuation increased 9.98% for a total of \$436,291,823. Based upon this evaluation the Board of Education approved tax requests and levy requests of: \$2,195,405.03 (\$0.503196 per \$100 assessed valuation) for the General Fund; \$610,101.00 (\$0.139838 per \$100 assessed valuation) for Special Building Fund; \$225,252.52 (\$.051629 per \$100 assessed valuation) Qualified Capital Purpose Undertaking Fund; \$124,357.57 (\$.028503 per \$100 assessed valuation) for the Technology Bond Fund. Each of the amounts includes the County Treasurer's one percent commission. The total tax request for the 2015-2016 budget is \$3,155,116.1 (\$.723166 per \$100 assessed valuation). The levy request amount decreased \$.062569.

Testing:

- ♦ The ACT test prep course taught by Mr. Smiley & Mrs. Hofstetter is currently in progress. The John Baylor ACT Prep Online Course is also an investment by our school to assist your student in preparing for the ACT (an important measure used for college admission and financial aid). We are excited that our students will have the opportunity to receive excellent test preparation between these two courses. We will be offering the John Baylor Test Prep class (free of charge) to juniors and seniors during the school day leading up to the October 24th test.
- ♦ Juniors interested in taking the PSAT

will do so on Wednesday, October 14th. The PSAT is the qualifying test that includes students in the annual academic competition among high school students for recognition and college scholarships. The program is conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. It shows firsthand the kind of reading, math, and writing skills that students need to succeed in college. If you have any questions regarding the test, please call Mrs. Kroon at (402) 446-7265.

♦ Juniors and seniors needing to take the COMPASS test will do so on Thursday, November Representatives from SCC-Beatrice will come to Meridian to administer the test to our students. This test is used to help place students in level appropriate classes for many junior colleges. It is also used to place students in dual-credit courses that require entrance scores during the senior English vear (ex: Composition). There is no fee to take this test.

Group College Visits:

The freshmen class will have the opportunity to tour Peru State College on October 28th. Their day will begin with a presentation from the admissions office. The students will get a tour of the campus and have the opportunity to ask questions. The students will also experience the college cafeteria (lunch will be provided at no cost to your student).

Students Missing Days of School

Meridian Public Schools and staff take student attendance very seriously and we hope that you, as parents, do as well. We feel attendance is a big part of the learning experience and helps mold children into independent, responsible, prompt young men and women.

Remember...communication is necessary between the school and parents as to why a student is not in school. Parents can call, send a note, or email the school. If your child tends to miss a large number of days of school, this can be an important detriment in earning his/her credits. REMEMBER-Grades are not the only thing taken into account in earning credits for each class. Attendance is a big factor. If your child always misses the same morning class period, he/she might not be earning those credits. Know what classes are required for graduation.

Here are the 2015-16 handbook guidelines for attendance, verification of absences, and graduation requirements.

2015-16 Handbook guidelines – **ATTENDANCE** (page 24) states:

Any student's absences, excused or unexcused, of more than five (5) days in one quarter or the hourly equivalent may cause his/her class credits to be denied for the semester. The number of absences is considered on a period-byperiod basis. The building principal will make the determination if credit is to be granted or withheld after investigating the student's EXCESSIVE ABSENTEEISM RECORD. The principal has the right to require any / all missed time from class period(s) to be made up before favorable determination of granting credits will be considered.

A family who has a student with more than five (5) days missed (or "the hourly equivalent") in any given quarter and/or does not send the required parental notes to school as school policy requires, can expect written correspondence from the school or a request for a meeting to discuss the excessive absenteeism. The school may report to the county attorney of the county in which the person resides when the school has documented the efforts to address excessive absences, the collaborative plan to reduce barriers identified to improve regular attendance has not been successful, and the student has accumulated more than twenty (20) absences per year. The school shall notify the child's family in writing prior to referring the child to the county attorney. This is as suggested by Nebraska State School Law 79-209 (Compulsory Attendance).

2015-2016 Handbook guidelines-VERIFICATION OF ABSENCE (page 25) states:

Parents/guardians are required to call the school by 8:30 a.m. each morning to inform the school of a student's absence and explain the reason why the student is absent. After 8:30 a.m., a phone call to the parents/guardian will be made if notification has not been completed. Parents/ guardians are asked to submit a written excuse for all absences in advance if at all possible. The written excuse should include the number and dates of the days gone, and a specific reason for the absence. IF THE STUDENT HAS BEEN ILL OR IS ABSENT FOR **SOME** OTHER REASON. THE STUDENT SHOULD BRING EXCUSE FROM HOME ON THE DAY HE/SHE **RETURNS** SCHOOL IF AN EXCUSE IS NOT RECEIVED WITHIN TWO SCHOOL DAYS. THE ABSENCE WILL BE CONSIDERED UNEXCUSED AND **STUDENT** WILL RECORDED AS TRUANT. Class time missed exceeding the seven (7) day limit will be made up before class credit will be given. Written excuses from the parent/guardian must be specific in regard to the reason for the absence. Notes that are generic (i.e. John was absent vesterday (give date), please excuse." will considered he UNEXCUSED until further specific information is given to the High School Principal's Office. Additionally, students are asked to bring documentation from appointments such as doctors, dentists, therapists, eye doctors, etc. This documentation could be very useful to the student if the student exceeds his/her allowed absences.

2015-2016 Handbook guidelines - GRADUATION AND COURSE REQUIREMENTS (page 25) states

participate in commencement exercises or receive a Meridian Public Schools diploma a student must fully complete all requirements for graduation prior to the official commencement exercises. and complete other administrative requirements conditions. Students who graduate from Meridian Public Schools must accumulate 220 hours. The total graduation requirements must include the following core curriculum:

English = 40 Semester Hours Science = 30 Semester Hours Math = 30 Semester Hours Social Studies = 40 Semester Hours (American Government is required) PE = 10 Semester Hours Fine Arts = 20 Semester Hours (Music, Art, Curricular Speech, Curricular Drama) Computer Education = 10 Semester Hours Vocational Education or Foreign Language = 10 Semester Hours Electives = 30 Semester Hours All credit hours will be based on the formula set by the Nebraska Department of Education.

The SKIP Flu immunization clinic will be offered at your child's school on Wednesday, October 21, 2015.

To have your child vaccinated, please do the following:

- Complete and Sign the Permission Form
 You must complete the attached Permission Form and answer <u>all</u> the Screening Questions. Return the completed form to your child's school. Children without a <u>completed</u> and signed consent form will not be immunized. All questions must be answered.
- 2. Insured? -- Just include a copy of your Insurance or Medicaid/Medicaid Managed Care Cards
 Please <u>include a photocopy</u> of your Insurance or Medicaid/Medicaid Managed Care card. There will be
 no cost to your family as we bill the insurance company.
- Are you uninsured?
 Mark the uninsured box on the Permission Form. There will be no charge for the vaccination thanks to the support from the county boards.

All students will receive FluMist (nose spray) vaccine unless:

- a. The student has a health problem or risk such as asthma where the flu shot is recommended.
- b. You write on the permission form that you want your child to receive the flu shot instead of the nose spray.

Children under the age of nine who have never had the flu vaccine before, or did not receive two doses last year, will need a second dose (booster). Our nurses will review your child's record and will let you know if a booster is needed. We will come back to your child's school to give the booster.

If you need a flu shot, or know someone who needs one, and are unsure where to go, please call us! Remember—your flu shot protects both you and those you love!

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
