
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It is hard to believe but we are well into the school year. The first quarter will be concluding on Friday the 13th.

Harvest has been in full swing so everyone please take a few extra minutes with your driving and be safe with all the farm equipment on the highways and gravel roads.

The Meridian band marched at the state fair at the end of August. They will be marching again in the Harvest of Harmony Parade in Grand Island on Saturday, October 7. Please come support our band.

The Meridian Board of Education met on September 18, 2023, the Board approved the 2023-2024 annual budget as presented. The Budget Hearing was held at 7:00 P.M. and the 2023-2024 Tax Request Hearing immediately afterwards. District Assessed The Valuation increased 9% to a total of \$470,599,413 from last years \$431,724,724. Based upon this evaluation the Board of Education approved tax requests and levy requests of: \$2,808,081 (\$0.596703 per \$100 assessed valuation) for the General Fund; \$58,889 (\$0.012514 per \$100 assessed valuation) for Special Building Fund; \$0 (\$ .0 per \$100 assessed valuation) Qualified Capital Purpose Undertaking Fund; \$0 (\$ .0 per \$100 assessed valuation) for the Technology Bond Fund. Each of the amounts includes the County Treasurer's one percent commission. The total tax request for the 2023-2024 budget is \$2,866,970 (\$.609217 per \$100 assessed valuation, last year was \$ .694313).

- 3. Take your seat promptly.
- 4. Keep aisles clear at all times.
- 5. Stay seated until the bus stops or as directed by the driver.
- 6. Be quiet to avoid accidents there must be absolute QUIET at a railroad crossing stop.
- 7. Keep your head and arms inside the bus at all times.
- 8. Cross street/roads only when it is safe.
- 9. Obey the bus driver.

- Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Give them advance notice (at least 2 weeks), a specific deadline, and a copy of your Activities Resume.
- Ask at least two people to proofread your college or scholarship application.

Create an FSA ID for you and one for a parent. You'll need them for FAFSA.

Complete the FAFSA. FAFSA will not open until December 2023.

Complete college applications.

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
